

Twenty Years of Grantmaking, and More

In 1985, upon the sale of Milwaukee's successful Allen-Bradley Company, more than \$290 million was devoted to the establishment, as an independent institution, of The Lynde and Harry Bradley Foundation. This report marks the 20th year of grantmaking by that institution, which has since given away far in excess of that original endowment amount. During those 20 years, in fact, the Bradley Foundation hasgranted an average of around \$28 million in awards per year, with about 41% of its grants going to organizations in Milwaukee and Wisconsin.

A Letter to Our Community

he Bradley Foundation is institutionally "at home" in Milwaukee, where our donors, Lynde and Harry Bradley, established the family legacy that it is our trust to preserve. There are a host of national and international opportunities for philanthropy — and many of them deserve the attention of the Bradley Foundation. However, it is from 1241 North Franklin Place, Milwaukee, Wisconsin — our home in our community — that the Bradley Foundation views the world.

The Foundation grants within our own community account for well over a third of our total giving since our inception as a private foundation in 1985. These grants are assiduously researched by staff, thoroughly reviewed by a committee of local directors and presented to the full Board for final approval ... and they include many of our largest and most long-term grantees, those closest and best known to us. They are a critical component of the Foundation's philanthropy.

We apply what we learn from our national and international programs to Milwaukee and Wisconsin, so that the community receives attention and advice from the world's best thinkers, but it is a fair trade, for we often find ourselves providing the experience and wisdom of our community to a world that has much to learn from Milwaukee and Wisconsin.

This report describes the Legacy program, through which we carry on the traditional philanthropy of the fund as it had operated before 1985, and the local New Citizenship program, which is focused on the community-based institutions of civil society, such as neighborhoods, schools and congregations. Awards of \$13.6 million for Milwaukee and Wisconsin in 2004 raised the Foundation's in-state giving to approximately \$229.2 million in the 20 years since we were established. These awards help maintain an infrastructure of services and cultural opportunities in our community and carry on our donors' enthusiasm for Milwaukee and Wisconsin and their aspirations for our quality of life.

The officers, directors and staff of the Lynde and Harry Bradley Foundation are mindful of and grateful for our institutional roots in this community, and there is no aspect of our philanthropy that we are prouder of, or that we feel more responsibility for, than the local grants listed in this new report.

n 1903, Lynde and Harry Bradley established a new business in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. It took courage and confidence for them to risk resources in a new venture, based only on their judgment of what was and their vision of what could be. The Bradleys' confidence was bolstered by the knowledge that in America, not only were they free to start a business, but they could also begin again if they failed. The Bradleys, however, would not fail. Their business grew to become the internationally recognized Allen-Bradley Company.

When the Allen-Bradley Company was acquired by Rockwell International Corporation in 1985, a significant portion of the proceeds was dedicated to establishing The Lynde and Harry Bradley Foundation. Although it has no direct ties to the Allen-Bradley Company, the purpose of the Foundation is to commemorate Lynde and Harry Bradley by preserving and extending the principles and philosophy by which they lived and upon which they built their company. As their efforts succeeded, their business grew and eventually extended far beyond its Milwaukee headquarters. Lynde and Harry Bradley remained devoted to the city where they began their enterprise and in which they lived and worked for so many years. Thus, the Lynde and Harry Bradley Foundation is proud to continue its commitment to improving the quality of life in the Milwaukee metropolitan area and throughout southeastern Wisconsin.

The Bradleys lived and worked according to several philosophical principles. They believed that, over time, the consequences of ideas were more decisive than the force of political or economic movements. They recognized the interdependence of human endeavors — cultural, educational, philosophical, economic — and they rejected exclusionary emphasis on any single element. The brothers had an abiding belief in the dignity and decency of each person. They felt that only in an environment of political and economic freedom could individuals develop their talents, hone their skills and intellects, and contribute to the improvement of the human condition. The success of the Allen-Bradley Company stands as eloquent testimony to the enduring quality of these important principles.

The Bradley brothers were also committed to preserving and defending the tradition of free representative government and private enterprise that has enabled the American nation and, in a larger sense, the entire Western world to flourish intellectually and economically. The Bradleys believed that the good society is a free society. The Lynde and Harry Bradley Foundation is likewise devoted to strengthening American democratic capitalism and the institutions, principles and values that sustain and nurture it. Its programs support limited, competent government; a dynamic marketplace for economic, intellectual, and cultural activity; and a vigorous defense at home and abroad of American ideas and institutions. In addition, recognizing that responsible self-government depends on enlightened citizens and informed public opinion, the Foundation supports scholarly studies and academic achievement.

In 1985, a corporate foundation within the Allen-Bradley Company was transformed into an independent and larger institution, today's Lynde and Harry Bradley Foundation. To gain more insight into its donors' intentions, the Board commissioned a history which was aptly named by its author, John Gurda, *The Bradley Legacy*. Though all Foundation activities are a purposeful fulfillment of this legacy, the Board established a "Legacy Program" to ensure the continuation of the earlier foundation's philanthropic tradition and reflect the traditional quality-of-life interests the Foundation had historically maintained in primarily local institutions of service, art, culture, education and economic development.

The Legacy Program is specifically concerned with conserving the geographical focus and objectives of our institutional roots. The Legacy Program embraces social service and recreational programs, visual and performing arts organizations and educational and cultural institutions. It also includes all capital gifts and occasional initiatives, such as the Commission on Funding of the Performing Arts (1992), that may be required to assist in the coordination of local concerns.

The Local New Citizenship Program

Larger lessons learned from contemplating *The Bradley Legacy* inspired the Board of Directors in 1994 to establish the New Citizenship Program in support of citizenship and civic institutions. Respect for the human person and the closest of human institutions — family, neighborhood, congregation, local association — was a consistent theme in the lives of our donors. The philosophical perspective of the New Citizenship program views people as active citizens who are both capable of running their own affairs and personally responsible for their actions, not as helpless victims of social forces that are seemingly beyond their understanding or control.

Above and beyond the act of voting and other direct participation in the political process, genuine citizenship involves active participation in the vast realm of human affairs known as civil society, which encompasses all the institutions outside of and distinct from government through which we form and express our interests and values. Civic participation includes the fulfillment of our roles as loving members of our families; as students or concerned parents in our schools; as worshipful attendees at our churches, temples, and mosques; and as dutiful members of neighborhood organizations, clubs, and voluntary associations of all sorts. It also includes the full range of philanthropic activity, including the commitment of energy and resources to helping others. Citizenship, in this broader sense, engages the whole human being, and the institutions of civil society appeal to and sustain our spirit and heart as much as our mind.

Sustained by honesty, perseverance, self restraint, responsibility, and service to others, civic institutions — and the family members, neighbors, and fellow congregants we encounter within them — shape and reinforce values that modern government cannot even acknowledge. And as such institutions sustain us, the New Citizenship Program seeks to sustain them. The Foundation engages in national and international efforts to showcase the superior functionality of civil society, but also in our own community, through what has been named the Local New Citizenship Program, reaching out to agencies whose work is reflective of the self-help philosophy of neighborhood development and that cultivate leadership at the community level. The program has guided the Foundation to discover and support the organizational efforts of many diligent, industrious, and humble individuals who, as everyday citizens, have taken the problems of their neighborhoods into their own hands. These grassroots heroes — many compelled by faith — fight crime, poverty, urban decay, drug addiction, and moral decline at every turn, transforming people and entire neighborhoods, often with little outside support.

Since 1995, the Local New Citizenship Program has increased the percentage of awards made within Milwaukee and Wisconsin and, together with the Legacy Program, grants within the community comprise over a third of all Bradley giving.

National Grants to Wisconsin Organizations

A number of local organizations receive grants from Foundation programs with a national or international focus, further reinforcing the synergy between local gifts and other aspects of the Foundation's grantmaking.

Grantmaking Policies

he programs and funding decisions of the Bradley Foundation are the responsibility of the Board of Directors. At the discretion of the Board, the policies set forth herein will be modified in response to changing conditions and priorities.

The guidelines established by the Board of Directors will normally preclude funding for unspecified and undetailed overhead costs. No funds will be authorized for fees payable to fund-raising counsel. In addition, grants without significant import to the Foundation's areas of interest will only under special conditions be considered for endowment or deficit-financing purposes.

The Foundation will:

Normally award grants only to organizations and institutions exempt from federal taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and publicly supported under Section 509(a)(1), (2) or (3);

Favor projects that are not normally financed by public tax funds;

Consider requests for building projects and, limit grants to a fraction of the total project cost.

Grantees must possess the resources to properly administer grants from the Foundation. The Foundation conducts an annual evaluation of grants, and grantees are asked to provide periodic reports on the progress of their work.

wo steps are required in the application process. First, the applicant should prepare a brief letter of inquiry, describing the applicant's organization and intended project. If the Foundation determines the project to be within its current program interests, the applicant will be invited to submit a formal proposal.

The second step is the actual submission of the proposal. Applicants should submit a letter presenting a concise description of the project, its objectives and significance, and the qualifications of the organizations and individuals involved. Included with the letter should be a project budget, the amount of the grant sought from the Bradley Foundation, and other sources of support. The applicant should complete the "Grantee Tax Exempt Status Information" form included with the Program Guidelines and submit a copy of the IRS letter confirming the organization's tax-exempt and public-support status under Sections 501(c)(3) and 509(a), respectively, of the Internal Revenue Code.

Meetings between the Foundation staff and applicants, when necessary, will be arranged after the receipt of a written proposal. Final authority for making grants rests with the Board of Directors, which meets four times a year, February, May, August, and November. The Directors act on grant requests after proposals have been comprehensively reviewed by Foundation staff. Each proposal is reviewed according to its unique characteristics. To be considered at one of these meetings, proposals should be submitted by the following dates: December I, March I, June I, September I.

Whenever possible, proposals submitted by these deadlines will be considered at the next Board meeting. However, circumstances may sometimes require a lengthier period of review.

Because of the necessarily limited resources of the Foundation, many worthwhile projects cannot be supported. The demands on the Foundation's resources also limit the size of particular grants and the ability of the Foundation to make commitments for extended periods.
