Nomination of Norman Augustine for a Bradley Prize

Norm Augustine is a national treasure. He "retired" from professional employment 18 years ago. His retirement has been a priceless trove of volunteered leadership activities that have made uniquely positive, indelible contributions.

Following his MS from Princeton in 1959, he rose quickly as an industrial aerospace leader. He retired as CEO of Lockheed Martin in 1997. See his appended short biography. What he has accomplished during retirement is a remarkable story.

Augustine has served as Chairman of the American Red Cross, President of the Boy Scouts of America, and other pro bono contributions to organizations near the heart of this nation. He has led three singular National Academy and American Academy of Arts and Sciences studies characterizing challenges to America's world leadership and proposed cogent strategies to meet these challenges. These reports summarize the results:

- 1. Rising Above the Gathering Storm (2007)
- 2. Rising Above the Gathering Storm, Revisited: Rapidly Approaching Category 5 (2010)
- 3. Restoring the Foundation: The Vital Role of Research in Preserving the American Dream (2014)

Through these studies, and his incessant lecturing and writing of op-ed pieces, he makes clarion calls to address the United States of America's:

- competitiveness
- defense posture
- manufacturing
- investments in research & innovation
- challenges in education

He has led nationally distinguished panels for each of these landmark studies. His leadership and burning desire to make a difference resulted in no-holds-barred evaluations and recommendations. He has elevated the national debate and provided well-considered approaches to address these critical challenges.

For his remarkable achievements through impactful volunteer service, I nominate Norman R. Augustine for a 2015 Bradley Prize. This recognition could not possibly go to a more deserving American.

Board memberships: Black and Decker (1997-2010), Lockheed-Martin (1986-2005), Conoco-Phillips (1989-2006), and Proctor and Gamble (1989-2007).

Honors: Twenty-nine honorary doctorates; awards, including the National Medal of Technology by President Clinton (1997); Distinguished Public Service Award of the Joint Chiefs of Staff (2000); Distinguished Civilian Service Medal (the Department of Defense's highest civilian decoration) five times; the NASA Distinguished Public Service Medal (1997); elected to Eagle Scout Hall of Fame, 1998.

Greatest accomplishments: "Helping raise a wonderful family, traveling in 111 nations, and standing on both the North and South Poles."
